## 1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

## 1.1 INTRODUCTION

"Education is the means to empower individuals and elevate society as a whole."

#### -Swami Vivekananda

With the vision to furnish quality education, to generate socially conscious and conscientious citizens and to transform them into diligent and successful citizens, Chandrakona Vidyasagar Mahavidyalaya, affiliated to Vidyasagar University, came into existence on 16th December, 1985. Spread over 4.09 acres with the built-up area of 4557 square meters, the college is situated in a semi-urban E category municipality. It is a UGC approved institution and gained recognition under the UGC Act of 1956 U/S 2(f) & 12 (B) in 1994. In the initial days the college offered six General Degree courses and operated with only six lecturers and twelve non-teaching staff.

The college teaches courses in Humanities/Arts and Science streams. At present it has thirteen Honours and two General UG programmes. 19 full time faculties and 32 other teachers under the effective guidance of the Governing Body and the Principal, support of 23 non-teaching staff contribute wholeheartedly towards fruitful academic interactions and exchanges on and off the campus. The college campus serves as one of the study centres of Netaji Subhash Open University on Sundays and holidays offering scope to pursue UG and PG courses through ODL mode.

The green and clean campus pays homage to Indian history and rich cultural heritage by monumentalizing the contributions of Ishwar Chandra Vidyasagar and preserving heritage temple. The college has an open-air theatre, a seminar hall cum auditorium and a large gymnasium cum multipurpose hall. The campus is Wi-Fi enabled and ICT is extensively put to use in teaching-learning-examination as well as administrative affairs for best utilization of available resources.

Students from marginalized sections with disparate learning abilities, largely women and first generation learners primarily enroll in the institution. The college organizes sensitization programmes on various issues and encourages students to take part in various outreach programmes. The college has adopted Bhilaiboni, a nearby village with the vision of its overall upliftment. Latest additions to the college facilities are 'Center for Adivasi Studies' and 'Iraboti Skill Development Centre'

#### Vision

The vision of Chandrakona Vidyasagar Mahavidyalaya is to be the beacon of of hope and scope for youth of Chandrakona and adjacent areas. It continuously strives to bridge the gap between rural and urban opportunities by organizing on and off campus programmes and taking up leadership roles in various capacity building initiatives of the Government of India, Government of West Bengal and the affiliating university. It plays an important role in preservation of historical and cultural heritage through various academic and research activities. The college undertakes knowledge sharing ventures, empowers students to overcome obstacles,

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handholds them to realize full potential so that they emerge as agents of positive change in their community and beyond. By providing transformative educational experience the college emerges as a space where dreams are nurtured, talents are honed, futures are shaped with purpose and passion. The goal of the institution is to build a culturally rooted, inclusive and sustainable society.

#### **Institutional Weakness**

- Geographical location
- Lack of student diversity because of locational disadvantage and poor transport connectivity
- Frequent power cuts interrupt everyday college activities
- Fluctuating Internet Speed despite ILL connection
- Limited scope for expansion due to shortage of space and funds
- Slow processing of financial aid from funding agencies and bodies
- Inadequate staff strength: both Teaching and Non-Teaching
- Need to improve infrastructure and other facilities to support quality research
- Delays in administrative work because of inadequate staff strength
- Limited opportunities for regular staff upskilling
- Lack of consultative and placement opportunities for students on campus because of locational disadvantage and limited language skills
- Limited funds for library up-gradation and relocation
- Focus on collaboration and networking with industry and research organization for lab sharing, collaborative research etc., can be expanded
- Limited enrolment numbers due to category-wise fixed student intake capacity
- Not empowered to carry out staff recruitment
- Inability to fill vacant seats during admissions
- Inability to indulge parents and local residents regularly in college activities as their priority is agricultural and other income generating activities

- Alumni association not formally registered till 2023
- Lack of proficiency in English and Hindi
- Absence of language labs
- No accomodation for staff and students on campus

## **Institutional Challenge**

- Majority of student population hails from marginalized sections and are first-generation learners who need utmost care and attention: meeting their educational needs and striving for their wholistic development with limited resources is a mammoth challenge
- Maximum students are from rural, agrarian backgrounds with little or no support, encouragement and guidance from home; the college is their only platform for connecting them with mainstream educational and professional opportunities
- Students' background limits their exposure to outside world and the possibilities it offers. As they have very limited access to quality facilities and avenues for upskilling as they are overburdened with financial expectations from the family. They have to devote a substantial part of their time to agrarian

activities especially in sowing and harvest seasons

- Slow learners with minimum exposure to facilities and opportunities and maximum exposure to superstitions and conservative mindsets
- Devising solutions to ease transportation issues as students' hail from villages that may not be connected by concrete roads
- Obstacles in mobilizing funds and placements because of locational disadvantage
- Ensuring placements for students is difficult with such inaccessible conditions
- Migrant labour, early marriage and dropout due to financial instability as most students belong to agrarian and lower income backgrounds
- Difficult to ensure regularity in attendance of students as most work as farm hands in sowing and harvest seasons
- Inability to invest in hundred percent power back-up systems
- Expanding IT and ICT facilities because of fund crunch
- Devising solutions for students to bridge the digital gap between home and college
- Building a state of the art library and other facilities that will be beneficial for college as well as local residents
- Securing land for campus expansion and introduction of more courses
- Featuring in future NIRF listings because of slow pace in staff recruitment

## 1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

## **Curricular Aspects**

Chandrakona Vidyasagar Mahavidyalaya adheres to Vidyasagar University's prescribed curriculum and the faculty members participate in the syllabus framing workshops conducted by the affiliating university. Effective implementation of the curriculum is carried out by conducting activities like preparation of academic calendar and timetable before the commencement of academic year in consultation with Teachers' Council, I.O.A.C and Academic Sub Committee.

The Head of the Department in consultation with faculty members distributes syllabus, design departmental routine, monitor timely delivery of the curriculum by regularly conducting departmental meetings. Internal Assessment (IA) is conducted at regular intervals to monitor students' progress. Class tests, carry home assignments, remedial classes (for slow learners) and use of digital platforms like Google Classrooms, Teachmint-App, WhatsApp groups etc., are the parts of effective learning of students. The curriculum delivery process includes the lesson plans, student seminar, group discussions, departmental magazines, invited Lectures by eminent speakers, awareness programmes, workshops with certificate and VAC for skill development. Feedback from students and community members on teaching-learning activities helps us to detect problems and scope for improvement in near future.

In the past two years various value added courses have been offered for wholistic developments of students apart from the regular teaching-learning activities. College provides various facilities such as ICT enabled classrooms, functional laboratories, free access to computers, Library for advancement of learning. From the academic year 2022-2023 onwards *Digi locker* identity is created for the students to ensure the benefit of Academic Bank of Credits (ABC).

Apart from participation in Faculty Induction Programmes, Refresher Courses, Short Term Courses and Faculty Development Programmes; faculty members also avail the benefit of barrier free and easy learning by enrolling

in VIDYAN, NPTEL. The college Governing Body has approved the plan to create a recording studio on campus to encourage faculty to plan and design MOOCS.

## **Teaching-learning and Evaluation**

Chandrakona Vidyasagar Mahavidyalaya sticks to a well-administered and transparent approach in all academic activities. The college adheres to the admission schedule provided by the Higher Education Department, Government of West Bengal. Information regarding academic activities like admissions and examinations is displayed on website and all processess are carried out online to ensure wider reach and for maintaining transparency. On the basis of university guidelines, seat intake capacity of the college and by strictly adhering to reservation policies the college releases merit list for admissions. Post release of merit list students' are granted admission on first come first serve basis. Induction programmes for newly admitted students is organized at the onset of every academic session.

Acknowledging the students' heterogeneity in terms of their learning faculties and socio-cultural background, the institution takes on numerous learning and evaluation tactics like peer teaching, remedial or tutorial classes, seminars, workshops, excursions and field-studies. The college encourages melding of conventional teaching with online teaching/e-learning. Google Meet, Teachmint, and Google Classroom have been used for conducting online classes during the Covid pandemic. College YouTube channels, Facebook page, Telegram Groups and WhatsApp groups are created for information and knowledge dissemination as well as for effective teaching and learning. A sizable number of ICT enabled classrooms, easily accessible Wi-Fi connectivity across campus and virtual classrooms supplement knowledge sharing activities on campus.

The college maintains a continuous and robust internal evaluation mechanism to keep track of the progress of the students via assignments, class tests, presentations, debates, discussions, student seminars etc. The external evaluation of the students is scheduled and monitored by the University through the end semester examinations, practical examinations and viva voce. Results and other aspects of teaching-learing are discussed in the departmental meetings. For slow learners, special tutorial classes are conducted while for advanced learners, additional study materials are provided. The teaching-learning and evaluation process in the college are continually upgraded through the suggestions and feedbacks by the students at the end of each semester. Following the affiliating university, the college has adopted the National Education Policy (NEP) w.e.f. the academic year 2023-24.

#### Research, Innovations and Extension

Faculties are encouraged to participate in professional development courses like induction, refresher, workshops, short-term and faculty development programmes. Financial and administrative assistance is provided to the Teaching and Non-Teaching staff for upgradation of skills. Inorder to keep the faculty abreast with latest developments in syllabus and academics, the college encourages faculties' participation in workshops on syllabus revision, NEP, IPR, IKS etc.

The college management has established two research committees (Humanities and Social Science and Sciences) to facilitate research and extension activities. On application research grant is sanctioned from the college fund. The research committees supports publication of research in the format of books and the college has sole copyright of the material published. The colleges' research endeavours have enhanced understanding of grassroot realities, testing of fundamental principles and paving ways for practical applications of knowledge, preserving, archiving and documentation of local history and knowledge systems. Through strategic collaborations and interdisciplinary approaches the college harnessess the power of innovation for addressing pressing challenges, capitalizing emerging opportunities and for value creation for stakeholders. The college has garnered many prestigious awards and recognitions for its remarkable contributions to extension activities, showcasing the diverse talents and accomplishments of students and faculty.

Faculties regularly publish books with ISBN number, research papers in reputed national and international journals. The college has an Incubation Cell that fires the spirit of entrepreneurship, innovation and creative spirit. Iraboti Skill Development Centre is a promising step in the direction of strengthening incubation centre.

Besides organizing camps, awareness programs and conducting disaster management activities, the college NSS unit has adopted a village namely Bhilaiboni. Extension activities like this are vital bridges between research and praxis as they facilitate the dissemination and promote application of knowledge. The college signed MoUs with many institutions for sharing of knowledge, library, research and implements knowledge transfer strategies to ensure effective dissemination of knowledge and application of research findings by leveraging diverse communication channels and platforms like YouTube etc.

The college's sustained commitment to research, innovation, and extension drives its endeavours in the direction of meaningful progress, addressing complex challenges, and creating lasting value for society.

#### **Infrastructure and Learning Resources**

The Institute has adequate infrastructure facilities and learning resources for supporting various processess and programmes conducted on campus. Seminar room cum auditorium, gymnasium cum multipurpose hall, playgrounds, open air theatre with green room, libraries, common rooms and canteen emerge as interactive spaces that harness students talents, promote peer learning and further community engagement. The college makes optimum utilization of available resources so that the stakeholders can avail maximum benefit from existing facilities. For an example, the gymnasium cum multipurpose hall offer space for

arranging welfare activities like yoga training, public gatherings like fairs and exhibition etc., as well as for students' practice for artistic and cultural performances etc. Performances on campus are staged on the college open air theatre or seminar cum auditorium hall that is equipped with standard size interactive projector and sound system. The seminar cum auditorium hall is also used for teaching-learning activities as well as for organizing seminars, meetings, workshops, film screenings etc. The institute tirelessly seeks oppertunities for generating funds for infrastructural development and takes timely initiatives so that the efforts are realized in the right direction. Apart from the mentioned facilities the college has smart class rooms, well maintained laboratories, departmental libraries, e-learning facilities and free reprography services. The Institute regularly maintains and updates its information and communication technology infrastructure; from enabling Wi-Fi campus by subscribing to dedicated internet service like Internet Leased Line with adequate bandwidth to the extent of covering the most of the places in the campus under CCTV surveillance to address safety related issues.

The institute comprises a well-maintained playground, gymnasium and various courts for regular games and sports activities. These facilities help the college to emerge as a space for conducting not just college level activities but also help it emerge as a host for district level activities. Besides developing infrastructural facilities the institute also emphasizes on maintaining existing infrastructure. The institute aims to implement one card solution that will enable student identification and ensure prompt service. As an initiation in this direction college identity card and library card have been merged into one.

## **Student Support and Progression**

The institution's comprehensive approach to student support and progression underscores the commitment to providing a nurturing environment that ameliorates students academically, personally, and professionally. Significant importance is given to their holistic development and progression.

The institution proactively facilitates students with various central, state and private scholarships. Additionally, the college provides institution-sponsored freeships for physically challenged students and outstanding performers in sports and cultural activities. Skill enhancement programmes encompassing soft skills, language proficiency, life skills, and ICT/computing are organized to augment student capabilities, and utmost care is taken to boost student enrolment in these programmes. The institution prioritizes organizing international

conferences in a blended mode to ensure maximum number of students participation.

Career counselling sessions, placement fairs, and guidance for competitive examinations are being incorporated as integral components of the college's support system in recent times. An incubation cell has been established for fuelling the spirit of entrepreneurship. We have implemented a robust grievance redressal mechanism, offering students avenues such as registers, email, and drop boxes. Paramount importance is given to ensuring timely resolution and spreading awareness.

Despite predominantly hailing from agrarian backgrounds and being first-generation learners, the students are exhibiting a keen interest in securing careers in both government and private sectors. The institution actively encourages and supports students in pursuing higher studies, with a considerable number opting for post-graduation and equivalent courses. Notably, our students have started excelling in state and national level examinations such as NET, JRF, GATE, SLET, and TET.

Students are actively engaged in various sports and cultural activities. Many of them have achieved recognition at the university, state, and national levels. The institution hosts numerous cultural events to create a vibrant and inclusive campus environment.

The institution has a registered Alumni Association that plays a pivotal role in the institution's development through various support services. The alumni-driven renovation of a temple on the campus, exhibits their interest in the preservation of heritage.

## Governance, Leadership and Management

At Chandrakona Vidyasagar Mahavidyalaya, effective governance, leadership, and management involve collaborative decision-making among the Governing Body, Principal, Saculty, Staff, and Students. This collaborative approach ensures transparency, inclusivity, and accountability in the college's operations. Academic calendar and holiday list are published in the 1st week of January for effective and efficient planning of programmes and activities across the year.

Feedbacks from stakeholders such as students, faculty, employees, and alumni are collected and carefully considered to further informed decision-making processes. The Teachers' Council and IQAC oversee the quality of teaching and learning, while the management ensures smooth functioning of support systems. The IQAC plays a central role in driving continuous improvement and striving for excellence in leadership, governance, and institutional values. Financial support is provided to Teaching and Non-teaching staff for attending trainings, skill and faculty development programmes. The college prioritizes democratization of information and utilizes e-governance tools for tasks such as admissions, examinations, and financial management to strengthen transparency in operations. Health management services, including the WB Health Scheme and Sastha Sathi Scheme are available for both Teaching and Non-Teaching staff. The college co-

operative society extends financial support to staff as and when required. Professional development and academic programs are regularly organized and financial support is provided for carrying out the mentioned activities as well as for research. College meticulously utilizes funds received from various sources to promote overall development of the institution and its stakeholders. Internal and external audits are conducted periodically to ensure financial and academic integrity. Additionally, the college actively participates in accreditation processes such as NIRF, AISHE, and has ISO certification. However, at present the college is not in a position for full fledged implementation of NEP beacuse of resource and infrastructural and resouce limitations. The college signs MoU with both near and far institutions for fostering collaborations and expanding the horizon of education. The college encourages resource sharing by permitting local schools, govt. organizations and other bodies to use infrastructural aminities at free at present and plans to monetize them in future.

- The college is deeply concerned about the survival of Indigenous culture and has celebrated some events eg., Hul Diwas, Janjatiya Gaurav Divas, Santali Bhasa Divas to make everybody aware of freedom movements and tradition of Santal community. College has introduced honours programme in Santali and established a centre for Adivasi Studies to promote culture and education in Santali.

  organized several campaigns and health checkup programmes to improve the overall physical health of
  the students.

## **Institutional preparedness for NEP**

1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary:

The curricular framework provided by Vidyasagar University grants Chandrakona Vidyasagar Mahavidyalaya adequate scope to work with multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary approaches especially through the Generic Elective, Ability Enhancement Core Courses in ENVS and English prescribed under the C. B. C. S framework as well as the newly introduced courses under C.C.F.U.P like the VAC courses, multidisciplinary programmes that offer flexibility to the learner. The college encourages such endeavors by promoting teaching-learning and research in this direction. From the Academic Session 2021-2022, the college every year sanctions research grants to the faculty members for taking up

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	research projects on local issues with a multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary approach. The college encourages intra faculty exchange, inter college faculty and student exchange, internal audit and various participatory research activities for the promotion of multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary research.
2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):	From 2022-2023 onwards Digi locker identity has been introduced by the college so that students can avail the benefit of Academic Bank of Credits. Since the implementation of NEP the college has been encouraging students to share and create videos on the flexibility and opportunity that ABC offers. The college has taken steps to ensure that all students enrolled under the latest course structure i.e., C.C.F.U.P, have ABC identity so that credit transfer opportunities could be explored and availed by them.
3. Skill development:	Skill Development courses for enrolled students are a part of the curriculum. The college also offers Certificate/Value added courses that may benefit both students and alumni of the college. The college is also indirectly involved/collaborating with Skill Development Programmmes of the state and central government in various capacities. Recently, the college registered with MOE's NISP Portal and inaugurated the Iraboti Skill Development Centre on campus. Apart from the mentioned initiatives, to take the Government of India's vision of Skill India forward, the college is also making tireless attempts to sanction land for building a second campus in Chandrakona that would be solely dedicated to Skill Development. This initiative seeks to up the employability quotient of young learners and cultivate the spirit of innovation and entrepreneurship in the youth of Chandrakona and nearby areas.
4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):	Teaching-learning as well as dissemination of information at Chandrakona Vidyasagar Mahavidyalaya is carried out in Bengali and English as a majority of the students are first generation learners. For the ease of students, young learners and people of Chandrakona, the college uploaded a Bengali version of C.B.C.S framework on the college website. The institution offers Honours and General Courses in local languages namely: Bengali, Classical Language i.e., Sanskrit as well as in Santali, a language of Adivasi local community. Humanities

and Social Science departments teach courses on Indian thought, philosophy and classical literature. Indian Knowledge Systems are integrated into the teaching-learning process as they are a part of the curriculum and also because it enhances students' understanding of a topic or an idea as it helps in easy contextualization and leads to comprehensive understanding of a topic. Sanskrit Department in collaboration with Global Sanskrit Forum offers Certificate Course on Spoken Sanskrit and 15 day Text-Reading State level online Workshop in collaboration with the Department of Sanskrit, Srikrishna College, Begula to promote classical language. A sizable portion of invited lectures are conducted in the bilingual mode or in Bengali so that the students derive maximum benefit from these interactions. The college recently inaugurated Centre for Adivasi Studies and hopes to make it a centre of all activity related to preservation of local cultures. To provide further impetus in this direction the college sponsors projects on local culture and communities. College encourages and faculty members participate in the Indian Knowledge Systems Workshop conducted by UGC, HRDC. A faculty member completed the seven-day workshop at BHU's UGC HRDC in August, 2023. The concerned faculty is currently working on a project related to local history, documenting local festivals and is encouraging students to engage with local monuments. Recently, the faculty delivered an online lecture at Kalahandi University, Orissa. The said faculty recently has been selected for IKS Master's Programme and is scheduled to attend it from 26th Feb, 2024 to 2nd March, 2024 at Central Sanskrit University, Bhopal, Madhya Pradesh, India. 5. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE): Respective Head of the Departments, Academic Sub-Committee, Teachers' Council and IQAC orients faculty members to create awareness through student induction programmes regarding the Programme Outcomes (PO) and Course Outcomes (CO) at the beginning of the academic session and the same are brought to the notice of the students. 6. Distance education/online education: The college encouraged online teaching-learning during the pandemic by using platforms like Google Meet, WhatsApp, etc. Internal Assessments, Examinations and Evaluations were conducted online in this period. Since then, knowledge exchange

through online/blended mode has become a part of the colleges' curriculum delivery process. Zoom and Google subscriptions help in carrying out international interactions in a smooth and hassle-free manner. Various apps are used by faculty to support offline learning. The Governing Body of the college has passed a resolution to build a recording studio in the college premises to encourage faculty participation in the creation of MOOCs and engagement with SWAYAM. The college has a Study Centre of Netaji Subhas Open University in its premises which is recognized by the UGC Distance Education Bureau that offers both UG and PG courses and promotes distance learning.

The Institution ensures effective curriculum planning and delivery through a well-planned and documented process including Academic calendar and conduct of continuous internal Assessment

#### **Response:**

Chandrakona Vidyasagar Mahavidyalaya affiliated to Vidyasagar University adheres to the university prescribed curriculum. Select faculty members of the college participate in the Syllabus Framing Committee Workshops and Review Meetings of the affiliating University.

Effective implementation of the curriculum is carried out by conducting timely activities like preparation of timetable and academic calendar before the commencement of each academic year with necessary deliberations with Teachers' Council, I.Q.A.C and Academic Sub Committee. Vidyasagar University's UG Academic Calendar is strictly adhered to as the college is an affiliated institution but in order to further streamline college related activities, planning and effective implementation of academic, co-curricular and extracurricular activities the college prepares its own academic calendar in keeping with the University's Calendar. The University Calendar and the Academic Calendar of the college are shared on the college website, displayed on college notice board and the HoD's of respective departments also share the same with students to doubly ensure that the students are in loop.

The academic calendar of the college mentions:

- Tentative Dates of Continuous Internal Assessments
- End Semester Examination
- · Days Observed by the College
- Tentative Dates of Co-curricular and Extracurricular Activities like Sports, Cultural Activities
- Holidays

The HoD's in consultation with faculty members distributes the syllabus, design respective departmental routines maintaining the structure of central routine, monitors timely delivery of the curriculum by regularly conducting Departmental Meetings and Internal Assessments (IA). Internal Assessment is a

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continuous, systematic and a time bound process at the institution. The Academic Calendar provides tentative dates for IA in keeping with the University Calendar. Since, the credit of IA adds on to the final credit; students are notified at least a week in advance regarding the scheduled dates for IA to ensure their preparedness. Two formal IAs are conducted for all courses each semester and adequate gap is ensured between both so that students can be evaluated on a sizeable portion of the syllabus completed. Apart from IA, Class Tests and Assignments, Carry Home Assignments, extra classes (for slow learners), sharing question bank on digital platforms and use of digital platforms like Google Classrooms, Teachmint, WhatsApp group, YouTube links etc., for sharing academic material and to further academic dialogue.

HoD's are responsible for making mentor-mentee groups, record keeping, designing the IA Question papers with inputs from fellow faculty members, distribution of IA scripts, consolidation of marks and ensuring its timely submission on University Portal. Faculty members of the institution also make Teaching Plans to ensure the curriculum is delivered by faculty members in a planned and organized fashion. Teaching plan is prepared by select departments to facilitate teaching and learning. Regular Departmental, Academic Sub-Committee, Routine and Examination Committee meetings are held to ensure the process is well planned and smoothly executed.

## 1.3 Curriculum Enrichment

#### 1.3.1

Institution integrates crosscutting issues relevant to Professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values, Environment and Sustainability in transacting the Curriculum

#### **Response:**

Vidyasagar University addresses crosscutting issues related to Professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values, Environment and Sustainability into the UG curriculum and almost all Programmes taught at Chandrakona Vidyasagar Mahavidyalaya reflect the same:

**Professional Ethics** –Education in today's world is a gateway into the world of professional engagement and courses from the UG Education Honours programme offers a paper titled, DSC-1: 'Life Skill Education' that emphasizes on professional ethics while in Bengali Honours texts like *Rajpuri* by Manmatha Roy, *Shey* and *Muktadhara* by Tagore, *Samyabadi* by Kazi Nazrul Islam and content of the first core paper in Santali Honours titled History of Santali Ancient Literature (section iii); 'Issues in Ethical Security: Protecting Programs and Data Information and Law', taught by the Computer Science and course modules of Physical Education on Personality Development and Interpersonal Skills, Yoga and Stress Management work to build greater awareness of professional ethics among students.

Gender –Gender sensitization plays a crucial role in the evolution of students into sensitive and sensitized citizens. Following papers from English address the above mentioned issue namely: 'Contemporary India: Women and Empowerment', 'Gender and Human Rights', 'Women's Writing', 'Media, Gender and Human Rights' and in the UG Political Science course 'Women's Movement' are taught. Texts like *Shakta Padabali, Miranda o Desdemona, Birangana, Mahuyapala, Banglar* 

Broto and fictional works like fiction like Manmi, Khuni Matkom Dare, Boyha Kuri, Maya Sutam and Mati Mai are discussed in the syllabus of Bengali Honours and Santali Honours respectively. Courses titled 'Some Perspectives on Women's Rights in India', 'Gender and Education in India' to name a few, are taught by the Department of History while Education teaches papers 'Gender and Society' and 'Women Education' and the Philosophy syllabus engages with topics like 'Feminism' and 'Eco-feminism.'

**Human Values** –The curriculum of Education Honours has courses on Peace and Value Education as well as Value Based Education, Philosophy offers a course on Value Education for students from General Programme while Geography Honours teaches various courses that focus on Society, Demography, Ethics to help young minds critically engage with ideas on Human Values especially the papers dealing with Environmental Geography, Sustainable Development and Regional Planning and Development. Select section of core courses in Santali Honours namely CC1, CC3 and DSE 2 and engage with texts like *Marangok* and Hariyar Dhubi Ghas draw attention towards human values.

Environment and Sustainability –Enhancing awareness about environment and sustainability is crucial in today's day and age; AECC EVS paper 'Environmental Science' offered in second semester to all students works towards this goal in UG curriculum. Environment and sustainability is addressed in Core, SEC and GE courses of Geography, Economics, Physics and Chemistry. For example, the curriculum of Geography plays a crucial role in enhancing awareness and understanding of environmental issues like pollution, hazards like climate change and conservation. The syllabi of Sciences focus on various dimensions of environment ranging from ecology to green chemistry while Social Sciences address issues on Human Rights, Social Change, Social Problems and teach topics like Global Warming, Human Values.

## **Empirical / Experiential Learning:**

### 2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

### 2.5.1

Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

### **Response:**

Internal Assessment (IA) is a continuous, systematic and a time bound process at CVM. The Academic Calendar provides tentative dates for IA in keeping with the University Calendar. Since, IA credit adds on to the final credits; students are notified at least a week in advance regarding the scheduled dates for IA to ensure their preparedness. Two formal IAs are conducted for all courses each semester and adequate gap is ensured between both so that students can be evaluated on a sizeable portion of the syllabus completed in each case.

The HoD distributes IA scripts among faculty members. The scripts are evaluated, the evaluator discusses answers, shares lapses so that the students are aware of shortcomings and take adequate steps for bettering performance in future assessments. IA marks are recorded in the Marks Register of the Department and the scripts are preserved so that they are available for ready reference in case of any dispute. During the pandemic, both internal and external assessment and examinations were conducted online by the college and the marks as well as the scripts are well preserved. Grievances regarding IA are at the earliest resolved by the HoD in consultation with the evaluator under the able guidance of the Principal.

For the external/ End Semester UG examination the affiliating University i.e., Vidyasagar University has

a robust grievance redressal mechanism. After the publication of result a student may apply for postpublication review of one's answer scripts (Theory Papers only) in the prescribed manner by submitting a form and requisite fee per paper within the date notified by the Controller of Examination at the time of result declaration. A student may apply for re-examination/review of not more than 02 (Two) theoretical papers in each semester, if he/she has scored qualifying marks i.e. 20% in that semester, and also secured 35% marks in other individual papers. Applications for review are forwarded by the Principal/TIC of the concerned college. In case of variation of marks for more than 5%, an average of marks awarded by the examiner appointed for Re-examination and the original examiner is taken into account for computing the result of re-examination. Students may also opt for post-publication scrutiny or self inspection of one's answer scripts. In such cases a student may apply for self inspection or RTI of one's one or more answer scripts irrespective of marks by paying requisite fee via the Principal/ TIC of the concerned institution. Photocopies of evaluated scripts are handed over to the student within 30 days from the date of the receipt of the application. After receiving the application within ten days the student has to finish self inspection and submit observations in the observation sheet provided by the university duly verified by the HoD of the concerned department and the same is forwarded by the Principal/TIC to the office of the Controller of Examination. Post-publication scrutiny gives students' an opportunity to verify scripts and records but does not provide scope for examination or re-assessment of scripts.

### **Response:**

Chandrakona Vidyasagar Mahavidyalaya offers 15 programmes at the UG level. The curriculum is framed by the affiliating University, i.e., Vidyasagar University and the institution strictly adheres to the prescribed curriculum, however, since the outcomes are not explicitly defined by the University the respective departments of the college take adequate care to analyze and identify the learning outcomes of the courses that are taught in the college to create awareness about the outcomes of the course they seek enrollment into. The C.B.C.S framework has been translated into Bengali by a faculty member and both the English and Bengali versions are uploaded on the website so that students are well aware of the course structure. Programme and Learning Outcomes are uploaded on the college website to ensure students have ready access, creates impetus in faculty to achieve projected outcomes and increases accountability in service delivery. Departmental Orientation programmes play a crucial role in making students aware about the outcomes of each course.

The faculty members are committed to the wholistic development of students by ensuring in depth engagement with the prescribed texts and secondary readings. Critical thinking as well as articulation of one's ideas is encouraged by helping students connect readings with the real world issues like that of;

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superstitions, gender inequality, caste based discrimination, environmental issues etc. Such approaches help students to engage with issues they and their communities encounter in everyday life and practices. Courses like AECC (MIL), AECC (Environmental Sciences) SEC, courses are taught for bettering communication skills and strengthening ties with the environment. Such courses engage with theory as well as practical aspects of effective communication and sustainable development.

Extension and cultural activities by various departments, Co-curricular bodies/Cells and Sports play a crucial role in furthering student interaction across disciplines. These activities help students to recognize each other's strengths and weaknesses and help them in respecting other disciplinary perspectives and cultural plurality. Working in teams for various college programmes help students to appreciate team work and in developing leadership qualities. The emphasis on discipline helps students develop professional ethics.

Awareness and Plantation drives, Rallies, Community Engagement and Awareness Videos made and circulated by students highlight social responsibility, encouraging wise use of natural resources and how education can be an agent of change.

Observation of days of national importance especially Independence day, Republic day, Constitution Day and participation in UGC recommended activities play an important role in nurturing patriotism as well as in acquainting students with the ideals of nation building and the crucial role they can play as a future citizens by whole heartedly abiding to civic rules and performing duties with sincearity and dedication to build a just and fair society. Training to work in a teams is inculcated by encouraging group participation in various departmental, cultural and extension activities. Students develop leadership qualities and learn to embrace plurality, respecting others' views, mediate in disagreements, while maintaining professional and life ethics. Such measures are further propelled by ensuring student engagement with eminent academicians, social workers and professionals.

### **Response:**

The POs and Cos shared on the college website stating and defining the outcomes provides a clear roadmap to the students (as most college students are first generation learners) underlining expectations from the respective Programmes and courses. Such endeavors are a step in the direction to create transparency and build a concrete plan for the wholistic development of a young learner at Chandrakona Vidyasagar Mahavidyalaya. Assessing the attainment of the same on regular intervals by respective teachers is done by gauging student engagement with, and performance in, enrolled programmes and courses, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities as well as by gathering data about their achievements

after their successful completion of Undergraduate programmes.

Adhering to the guidelines of Vidyasagar University the institution designs the Academic Calendar that puts forward a roadmap for its plan of action. The college conducts internal assessment through IA, Practical, Class Tests at regular intervals, and also closely monitors student performance in End Semester exam, engagement in classes, tutorials, participation in various competitions, cultural and social activities and their zeal for community engagement. The Feedback and Grievance Redressal mechanisms play a crucial role in gathering inputs from the students and other stakeholders of the college community. Student participation and expression of opinion in co-curricular and extra-curricular activities help faculty members gauge learners' understanding of ideas discussed in their courses.

Even though the traditional method of evaluating the attainment of POs and COs are end semester results and professional achievements the college believes that such measures may not be apt for the students, since, a majority of the students are from: rural backgrounds, first generation learners, learners from marginalized sections of society and females (from a locality where child marriage is rampant); therefore, the college cannot work with standardized benchmarks.

However, student progression to higher education, placements and their contributions to local society and community help us to ascertain the impact of learning outcomes in both direct and indirect ways. Some of the college students have managed to carve a niche for themselves in the local community while others after completion of their graduation pursue Post Graduate studies (M. A/ M. Sc/ MBA) or enter the professional arena in various capacities.

The college Placement Cell, Skill Development Cell and the Incubation Cell arranges for various upskilling activities, career counselling, invites various bodies to help in guidance and preparation for competitive exams, workshops, campus placements and other activities to encourage students to pursue novel professional careers. Active participation of students and the community in various extension activities/ drives, their contributions to the local community and performance in the professional world are indeed proof of the knowledge, wisdom and skill gained from the courses taught.

### 3.2 Innovation Ecosystem

#### 3.2.1

Institution has created an ecosystem for innovations, Indian Knowledge System (IKS),including awareness about IPR, establishment of IPR cell, Incubation centre and other initiatives for the creation and transfer of knowledge/technology and the outcomes of the same are evident

### **Response:**

Academic and research activities carried out by the college play an important role in building an innovative ecosystem for creation and transfer of knowledge. Conferences, Seminars, Workshops, Faculty and Student Exchanges, various resource sharing ventures are some initiatives in this direction. Financial and administrative support is granted to Teaching and Non-Teaching staff for upgradation of skill set. The annual performance appraisal system motivates faculty to enhance their academics and institutional Research Committees encourage faculty to take up Research Projects and better research performance by providing grants for conducting minor research on local issues. For this purpose a substantial amount is sanctioned by the college since FY 2022-23. Apart from departmental research activities, projects, field surveys; lectures by local knowledge keepers create awareness regarding the rich cultural heritage and history of Chandrakona and nearby areas. Computer Science department's projects on smart box, smart bin and automatic water dispersal system; their collaboration with Department of Physics and Chemistry in publishing a book with multidisciplinary approach are examples of innovative

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ecosystem and knowledge creation. Similarly, the Department of Bengali, Chemistry, Education, Geography, History in recent times conducted various field surveys and have generated knowledge on local issues while the English Department has translated a booklet on local history.

One International Multidisciplinary Conference titled "From the Partition to the Pandemic: Convergences in Humanities" in collaboration with Anthropos India Foundation was organized by the Department of English in March, 2022 and an International and Interdisciplinary Conference on "Globalization: Impact on Society and Culture" was organized by the college in January, 2023 in collaboration with Institute of Cross Cultural Studies and Academic Exchange (ICCSAE), USA. A workshop in March, 2022 for staff was organized in collaboration with Ghatal RS Mahavidyalaya and on February, 2023, a NAAC Revised Accreditation Framework Workshop was organized to provide a common platform to non-accredited institutions for sharing latest developments, listening to impediments and devise solutions to kick start the accreditation process. To attune faculty with latest developments in academia like implementation of NEP and relevance of IPR and IKS the college encourages faculty to participate in workshops on novel topics.

### **Response:**

Chandrakona Vidyasagar Mahavidyalaya is a thirty-eight year old institution with very humble beginnings. At the time of its inception the college had minimum infrastructure and physical facilities. However, with the passage of time the college steadily developed and strengthened its infrastructure. Presently the college is equipped with a well-maintained Administrative Building, ICT-enabled & Smart Classrooms, Laboratories, E-Learning Centres, Library with an E-Corner, Departmental Libraries, General Staff Room, Departmental Staff Rooms, Store Rooms, Electrical Room, Generator Room, Seminar Hall cum Auditorium, Gymnasium cum Multi-purpose Hall, Playground (Football, Kho-Kho, Kabaddi), Basketball Court (outdoor) Volleyball Court (outdoor), Badminton Court (indoor and outdoor), Medical Room, Cultural Equipment/Green Room, Open Air Theatre with Green Room, Iraboti Skill Development Centre, Centre for Adivasi Studies, Separate Common Rooms for Boys & Girls and a functional canteen.

19 ICT enabled rooms with optimum LED light and electricity facilities support teaching-learning & 08 out of these are smart classrooms. Faculty also use virtual classrooms like Google Classroom, Teachmint etc., to support teaching-learning. The E-learning Centre and E-Corner enable access to the virtual world. 12 Departments of the college have their respective Departmental Libraries, Computer and Printer facility apart from this the college also provides a shared Computer Facility for faculty in the Common Staff Room to support ICT aids in teaching-learning. The college has ten laboratories in total and the break up is as follows: Physics (02 labs), Chemistry (01 lab), Computer Science (02 labs), Geography (02 lab), Mathematics (01 lab) & Physical Education (02 labs).

Over thousand good quality benches for students, large Blackboards, Whiteboards, Laptops and Computers, Smart boards, Projectors, Scanners, Printers, Scanner cum Printer, Webcams, Headsets, LED Screen, Speakers, Microphones (Cordless & with Cord), Trolley Speaker, Smartphone, Generators, Invertors, Refrigerators and Reprography Machines, Barcode Scanners, External HDD & Pen Drives as well other necessary facilities in good condition constitute the basic infrastructure of the college.

Sports and Cultural Activities are accorded due importance at the institution. For sports related activities the following facilities are available: Gymnasium & Yoga Centre with Mats/ Multipurpose Hall (560 sq. m.), Indoor Games Facilities, Playground (2420 sq. m.) for Track and Field activities. Apart from the usual gymnasium, sports and games equipment following devices are used to ensure well-being and optimum performance of students and faculty in co-curricular and extracurricular activities:

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Sphygmomanometer with Monitor (02), Glucometer (01), Oximeter (01), Spirometer (01), Stadiometer (02), Weighing Scale (02), Smart Weighing Scale (01) to name a few.

While the cultural equipment/ green room provides space for storage of musical instruments and other equipment used in cultural activity, the multipurpose hall and Open Air Theatre provides a platform for students to practice and perform cultural activities both folk and mainstream. The notice board of each department accesses their class routine and latest academic information apart from a Wall Magazine board for students to display their creative writings, paintings etc. This activity helps in boosting student creative skills and articulation.

### **Response:**

Chandrakona Vidyasagar Mahavidyalaya has a furnished, partially automated, open- access central library with more than 16332 books, e-books, e-journals, magazines, and weekly and daily newspapers (both English & Bengali) and employment related newspapers. Apart from these the college library has a Reading Room, Online Resource Centre, Reprography, Book Bank and Remote Access facility. To ease OPAC access and encourage learners to use digital resources the college library drop down menu has been designed in Bengali.

ILMS Software and OPAC are employed by the college library to make processes efficient and effective. From the Academic Session 2023-2024 the college merged Identity Card and Library Card into One Card (with Barcode Facility) for students. This venture is a step towards e-governance and takes forward the "One Student, One Card" initiative.

**Orientation Program:** Keeping in mind the changing nature of library access especially after the popularization of digital access the Central Library of the college introduced Library Orientation Programme from the Academic Session 2022-2023. **Departmental Library:** All Honours departments of the college have their respective Departmental Libraries with more than 1200.0 books of which can be accessed by students according to their interests and convenience. Some department libraries are maintained by students.

Chandrakona Vidyasagar Mahavidyalaya makes optimum use, updates its IT and Wi-Fi facilities in keeping with the growing demands of the college community, necessary interventions crucial for college development and for taking forward GoIs dream of Digital India. Below mentioned are the details of interventions made by the college:

- 102 computers (including laptops for teachers and office staff) are updated and upgraded as and when required.
- Online admission system was introduced in 2019
- All Payments to the college were initially through digital payment via Bank with a minimum banking charge
- Billdesk (Online Payment Gateway) was introduced in 2022 so that students do not have to pay banking fee
- College Management Software used for all student related work including challan generation,

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creation of Identity Card, feeding student data in the university portal for registration, accounts related work etc., was designed by the Software Programmers Mr. Santanu Ganguly and Mr. Sukanta Roy. They were also in-charge of the development of the college website till Academic Year 2022-2023.

- From the Academic Year 2023-2024 college website is maintained and upgraded regularly by Affinity Infosoft.
- The college subscribed to Internet Services provided by a local vendor and BSNL till December 2021. LAN connections were provided in the college administrative block and Department Rooms. Internet access was easy for college staff and faculty but very limited for students.
- ·Keeping in mind the changing scenario and challenges in Higher Education after the first phase of the pandemic and following the guidelines of UGC i.e., integrating technology in everyday teaching-learning, the college introduced following measures to make information more accessible, knowledge sharing interesting and for bringing transparency and accountability in day to affairs:
- Online feedback from stakeholders was introduced from the Academic Year 2020-21
- G-suit was purchased in May, 2021
- Intercom facility introduced in Dec, 2021
- The college subscribed to an exclusive Jio lease line and the campus was Wi-Fi enabled in Dec, 2021 with 20MBPS bandwidth.
- CCTV was installed for security and continuous monitoring purposes in Dec, 2021
- Biometric Attendance for Staff and Faculty was introduced in Jan, 2022
- Internet Speed of Jio lease line was upgraded to 30 MBPS bandwidth in Jan, 2023 for better utilization of internet resources. The college separated the allocation of the bandwith between Wi-Fi users and CCTV i.e., 20 MBPS and 10 MBPS respectively
- Zoom Subscription was availed from Dec, 2022
- Star Cable Network is currently the back-up Internet Service Provider of the college
- Seminar Hall upgraded with Smart Projector for interactive presentation in 2022
- Library's KOHA software was upgraded to cloud version in March, 2023
- Barcode system one ID Card for students introduced in Academic Year 2023-2024
- Department of Geography uses software like 21st century GIS Professional Version and Q-GIS

The best example of the translation of the college's contribution to the local community are the college's Governing Body Members and Non Teaching Staff as a sizable section from both categories are alumni of Chandrakona Vidyasagar Mahavidyalaya. Both the stated examples stand testimony to the college's contribution in the field of education as well as in shaping well-rounded individuals who are assets for the local community as well as the country.

Both special and extraordinary times in Chandrakona, encourage friendly interaction between alumni and students. The College Foundation Day has always been an informal space for alumni engagement and extraordinary events like cyclones, floods and the pandemic situation have witnessed alumni support in relief and disaster management. The alumni of the college also play the role of trainers, coaches and groomers for the students and assist the college in organizing sports activities, grooming students in the arena of cultural activities like Youth Parliament, Debates and Elocution under the guidance of faculty members. Their examples of participation in community outreach in recent times are Blood Donation

The college's governance system is decentralized and provides operational autonomy to its functionaries:

To keep a check on all aspects of the appraisal system the college maintains biometric attendance and necessary registers for tracking leaves, Google forms and email records to name a few. The college from the Academic Session 2022- 2023 introduced individual student registers for teachers to strengthen the recordkeeping. The new register is designed in such a manner that all the details of the Academic Session let it be Student Attendance, IA, Tutorial, Practicals, etc., is recorded in a single register by the respective faculty members. Teachers submit their Self-Appraisal Report (SAR) on the basis of these records. Then these details are doubly cross verified by the college office and forwarded to concerned bodies for approval in a systematic manner. Non - Teaching staffs' performance on the other hand is evaluated by the college administration and recommended for the seven years benefit for Group D staff and on the completion of ten years and twenty years Group C staff respectively.

Apart from the activities that are mandatory for Performance Appraisal the I.Q.A.C of the college encourages both Faculty and Non - Teaching Staff to participate in various activities that will help them horne their skills.

### **Welfare Measures for Staff:**

- As prescribed by Government of West Bengal all permanent staff of the college are eligible to draw loan against Provident Fund
- Registered members of the college Cooperative society can avail loan facility at ease and at best interest rates, as and when required
- The casual staff and the permanent Non-Teaching of the college are granted exgratia once a year
- Interest free festival advance is sanctioned to the Teaching and Non-Teaching of the college on request basis
- Teaching and Non-Teaching Staff can avail the benefit of Salary advance system on request
- The college under the aegis of IQAC regularly conducts Health Check Ups and Awareness Camps for the college community and local residents
- Women's Cell and NSS of the college have undertaken some important measures in the recent past for creating awareness on first aid
- Both faculty and student help the college community to check and monitor Blood Pressure and Diabetes; the two biggest health related menaces in our time and age
- The college has taken measures for the enrolment of Faculty in West Bengal Health Scheme and interested faculty have availed the said benefit the rest claim a Medical Allowance every month

Chandrakona Vidyasagar Mahavidyalaya puts its best foot forward to mobilize financial resources required for infrastructural development, on and off campus activities and for community building interventions. Both Financial Donations and Donations in kind are accepted and encouraged and below mentioned are some examples from the past five years' record:

- Ex-faculty donated One lakh rupees for procurement of machines and instruments in the Skill Development Centre

- Furniture donated by faculty
- Alumni driven preservation of the Heritage Temple on College campus

A register is dedicated for recordkeeping of all donations. The college plans to generate funds by renting out facilities like Gymnasium, Auditorium etc.

The primary financial resources of the college are in the form of Grant-in-Aid from the Government of West Bengal. The said grant provides for the salary of the colleges' permanent employees. Fifty percent of the Tuition Fee collected from the students is spent on college development purposes.

The Annual Budget and monitoring of financial resources is spearheaded by the Finance Sub-Committee. The Finance Sub Committee comprising the Principal, Bursar and accounts section, chaired by the President, Governing Body; allocates funds for development, academic, co-curricular, extra-curricular and extension activities. All expenses discussed are proposed by different sections of stakeholders and departments (via various committees), every year. The requirements are discussed and recommended by the Finance Sub-Committee for approval to the Governing Body. All standard financial norms and procedures like quotations/tendering/ E-tendering etc. are followed for procurements and purchases. Strict financial discipline is maintained in case of cash payments. No cash payment is made except for contingency purposes. Digital mode of payment is encouraged and preferred by the college.

The Building Sub-Committee oversees new constructions, expansions and maintenance of available resources and ensures optimal utilization of available resources. E Facilities/Laboratories are shared by select departments. For example, the Department of Computer Science and the Department of Geography share the Computer Laboratory. Care is also taken to ensure minimal wastage of resources especially capital assets. Environmental, Energy and Green Audit is conducted.

External Auditors appointed by DPI, Higher Education, Government of West Bengal conduct the financial audit of the college and in case of delay the college appoints an auditor from the list provided by DPI, so that financial transparency is maintained.

During the pandemic volunteers from Krishnapur Welfare Society: A Non-profitable Organization, cleaned and sanitized the campus for free and in the post pandemic scenario the local municipality carries out said activities for free.

Under this circumstance, the college has created an exclusive cell for women and encouraged girl students to participate in the programs on gender sensitizations.

#### **Practice:**

- The program officers, coordinator and the volunteers of NSS unit and women's cell have implemented the awareness programs in consultation with NGOs, Legal and Health Experts and Government officials for the protection of women's rights and actively empower women creating conditions for gaining confidence in their abilities.
- College aims to prevent social evils like eve-teasing, ragging and dowry system providing necessary counselling and guidance.

Promotion of the Indigenous Culture and Local Knowledge Systems

#### **Objectives of the Practice:**

• Encourage inclusive environment and provide a common platform for the present generation from

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- both dominant and marginalized groups may exchange their ideas, technology and culture
- Spread awareness among students and community about the underprivileged yet culturally rich inhabitants of our district
- Protection and preservation of the popular customs, skills, wall painting ('Bhit Potaw'/ 'Rangoli' design) and other practices of tribal communities.

#### The Context:

Young people are mainly concern to the cutting-edge techniques and modern facilities. It is very important for a society that the students and youth are connected to the roots especially their traditions and indigenous culture. A significant number of students from Santali community take admission in the college every year. The college believes that it is imperative to preserve their cultural diversity, traditions and connect them organically to their roots

#### The Practice:

Chandrakona Vidyasagar Mahavidyalaya has taken the following initiatives to promote the indigenous culture:

- Honours programme in the Santali language has been introduced in 2019. In the academic session 2022-23, the Santali department is running with total 101 number of students including all three years.
- The college has celebrated the following events to make coming generations aware of the freedom movements by tribal community:
- HUL DIWAS on 30th June
- JANJATIYA GAURAV DIVAS on 15th November
- SANTALI BHASA DIVAS on the 22nd December
- Santal students participate in cultural programmes and perform Santali dance with folk music instruments like flutes, pipes and drums on campus
- An advisory board for Adivasi studies has been formed by the eminent Professors of Santali from Vidyasagar University and its affiliated colleges.
- A Centre for Adivasi Studies has been established for the first time among all affiliated colleges of Vidyasagar University.
- Various **traditional musical instruments** are displayed and preserved in the **museum** to create interest about the indigenous culture.
- The centre for Adivasi Studies organizes workshops on indigenous skills, arts, crafts etc.

#### **Evidence of Success:**

- Introduced three-year Santali honours programme. Students can opt Santali language as general course also.
- Better ethnic cooperation and ethnic harmony in the institution, digitalization of some old manuscripts in Santali, learning various indigenous ethnic skills related to arts and crafts, mutual respect for each other etc.
- The Covid guidelines has been translated in Santali and broadcasted through FM 90.8 MHz and

Internet radio station of Vidyasagar University.

• Providing 100% scholarship to tribal students

**Problems Encountered and Resources:** The college has not faced problems in promoting indigenous culture. However, organising activities for students without disrupting the academic schedules in a semester system is challenging. While organising the Santali programme in the college, necessary funds are released by the college to make their events successful. Financial Support or sponsorship is necessary for the implementation of students' cultural programs or to host any program related to this practice.

local community via outreach programmes. In view of the fact that a large section of students coming from economically weaker background, we need to take steps to cover some common health issues at free of cost. Keeping this in mind, the following activities were carried out:

- Interactive lecture session has been arranged on breast cancer in association with Medica Super speciality hospital (Kolkata) on campus. In this connection, a health awareness camp on women's

sexual and reproductive health was held on campus for staff and community. As one of the community outreach programmes, the college organized a free health awareness and medical camp in the adopted village 'Bhilaibani'.

- In the age of digitalization, students have to share longer time on the screen of computer and mobile for their online teaching and learning. Most of the times they neglect the eye health and fail to maintain good eyesight due to negligence. College has taken initiative to keep their eyes healthy by organizing free Eye Check-up camp for students in association with Lions Club.
- College provides the facility of separate medical room on campus. Regular primary health checkup like tests of blood sugar, blood pressure etc. for all students and staff is conducted by the staff of Physical Education department.
- College is concerned about the potential health hazards due to the drug addiction primarily among the students and youth in India. A MoU was signed between Prajapita Brahma Kumaris Ishwariya Vishwa Vidyalaya (PBKIV), Ghatal and the college to focus on mental & physical wellbeing of students and adolescent. In this connection, a social welfare programme has recently been organized on "Nasha Mukt Bharat" in collaboration with PBKIV to create awareness among students about the harmful effects of drugs.

In addition to that, the college has recently introduced the Group Personal Accident Insurance Policy for total number of 1089 students of the college. The students are insured under the ICICI Lombard Group Personal Accident Insurance policy with sum insured of two lakh rupees for each student. Students can get the benefit of cashless facility for hospitalisation and OPD due to accidental injury. It covers the cases of accidental burns, animal bite, snake bites and insect bites which are very common in this rural area. The college has paid a gross premium of Rs. 1,63,350/- for this insurance policy. Besides, the college has come under West Bengal Health Scheme for faculty members.

As the physical well-being is related to mental and emotional wellbeing also, the college cannot neglect this aspect as the studends are from 18-22 years, a sensitive age group, who need hand-holding to evolve into well- balanced future citizens. Moreover, suicidal attempts have been noticed in this district. Counselling programmes are arranged by the Physical Education department on campus for students and the college has participated in 'Suicide Prevention Camp' in Ghatal sub-division.

All teaching and non-teaching staff sincerely work to hold it in high esteem with loyalty and reverence in imparting quality education and providing support to follow the healthy lifestyle of students. In addition, dedicated gymnasium, playground, basketball court, medical room, modern laboratory, distinguished and dedicated faculty members, efficient support staff and green campus are assets of this college.

Through varios capacity-building initiatives, the college has been able to address the growing need to maintain good health and hygiene in post pandemic era and provide health insurance benefit to the students. The college has regularly organized several campaigns and health checkup programmes to improve the overall physical health and well-being of students, all stakeholders and the local community as the college believe the fact that a healthy student can build a healthy society and healthy society can build a healthy nation.

- Chandrakona Vidyasagar Mahavidyalaya constantly encourages and endorses students to participate in sports and extracurricular activities. Recently, a student secured 7th position in the inter-university competition held at TNPESU, Chennai in 2024 and has been selected for Khelo India University Games scheduled to be held at Guwahati.
- MoU signed with Appdex Private Limited, a private limited company providing vocational courses and allied services in the fields of different skill training modules under the guidelines of National Skill Development Corporation.
- Institution introduced individual Teachers' Attendance Register following self appraisal format.
- Constuction of a UGC funded Womens' Hostel on campus is on the verge of completion.
- The college applied for enlisting as a National Testing Agency examination center.
- Though the college runs no PG courses, it holds the prestige of becoming the examination centre of Vidyasagar University PG examination. Besides, the institution is the examination center of Netaji Subhas Open University UG examination and other public examinations.
- Rainwater harvesting system established in the college as an initiative of its proactive approach towards sustainable development.
- The institution in its manoeuvre to root out pollution within the campus, has tied up with West Bengal Pollution Control Board that has committed to provide us with financial aid to run awareness initiatives.
   The board has also supplied us E-waste bin for discarding electrical/electronic devices which leads to adverse human health hazards and environmental pollution.
- The college in support of government (like SDO, Ghatal, WB) and non-government (e.g. RICE Education, O2 Academy) organisations runs job preparation programmes.
- The college follows instructions of the UGC SAKSHAM portal and implements its guidelines.
- The college encourages teachers to register at the MMTTP portal.
- The college follows the Tweets/Xs of UGC, Sahitya Akademi and different central government ministries and re-Tweets them.
- The all-inclusive blossoming of the students is made realizable through sustenance of balance between academics, sports, yoga, co-curricular activities and other social responsibilities.
